Dear Mr. Derzon:

We currently are conducting a survey of New York's and Georgia's systems for recovering overpayments made to Medicaid providers and for returning to the Federal government its share of the recovered funds.

While performing the survey in New York, we learned that one State office responsible for collecting overpayments from Medicaid providers is the Office of Special Prosecutor. This office, which NEW certified under Public Law 95-142 for 90 percent Federal financial participation, has over 400 professional employees (auditors, investigators, and attorneys) and about 140 clerical and support staff involved in co<sup>+</sup>lecting overpayments and prosecuting providers who defraud the program.

The first Hedicaid overpayments collected by the Special Prosecutor's Office were in February 1976 and as of September 30, 1978, \$3.8 million had been collected. Interest earned as of September 30, 1978, on these collected funds was \$301,187 resulting in a total fund balance of \$4.1 million as shown by the appendix to this letter.

All of the collected funds are deposited and retained in a special, interest bearing account controlled by the State Comptroller's Office. None of the funds have been returned to the Federal government even though it pays approximately 50 percent of New York's Hedicaid expenditures--the remaining 50 percent is shared one half by the State and one half by 58 local governments (New York City and 57 counties).

According to State New Icaid officials, return of the Federal share of these funds has been dolayed because State and local officials have been unable to agree among themselves on a formula for distributing to each local government its proportionate share of the recovered funds. State officials agree with us, however, that this problem would not prohibit the State from determining and returning the Federal government's share.

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Because of the continued delay by the State to return the Federal share of these funds, we recommend that you require that

- --the appropriate adjustment or recoupment is made for the collected funds, including interest, on the September 30, 1978, Statement of Expenditures and
- -- the Federal government be given timely credit for its snare of future collections.

We would appreciate your advising us within the next 30 days of any actions taken or planned regarding this matter.
