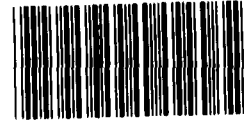

To the President of the Senate and the
Speaker of the House of Representatives

On February 5, 1986, the President's third special message for fiscal year 1986 was submitted to the Congress pursuant to the Impoundment Control Act of 1974. In order to give the Congress timely information on impoundments, we reported earlier on four deferrals and one rescission proposal of the third special message. On February 25, 1986, we reported on D86-37; on March 11, 1986, we reported on R86-67, D86-53, D86-38, and D86-35. Our report on the remainder of the third special message follows:

In addition to the \$101,309,000 proposed for rescission, the President is deferring \$40,000,000 in this account, pending congressional action on his proposal to terminate certain economic development assistance programs. See D86-36. The \$40,000,000 is proposed for reappropriation to administer outstanding grants and loans in the terminated programs.

The most recent apportionment schedule for this account shows an anticipated \$500,000 in recoveries of prior year obligations. The total budgetary resources are, therefore, \$26,618,053, rather than the \$26,118,053 reported in the message.

Because of an extraordinary excess of reserves in the Federal Employees Health Benefits Program, the Office of Personnel Management and a number of health plans decided to refund excess reserves to enrollees and the government. Rescission Proposal No. R86-73 proposes to rescind \$600 million, the amount of the government's share of the refund. Recent GAO audit work concludes, however, that the government's share is \$572 million, \$27 million less than that proposed for rescission. In his justification for this rescission proposal, the President states that the United States Railway Association (USRA) has completed all activities it was created to perform. The rescission would eliminate all funding for and terminate USRA by May 1, 1986.

One USRA function is to provide the Congress independent, expert advice regarding the sale by the United States of its 85 percent interest in Conrail. It is unlikely that the Congress will complete action on pending Conrail legislation before May 1, 1986, when the President would terminate USRA. The Department of Transportation, according to the message, would absorb USRA's oversight of Conrail and other parties participating in the proposed sale of Conrail. We believe that if USRA is terminated before the sale legislation is enacted, the Congress will not receive the independent, expert advice it needs in its consideration of that legislation.

In the justification for this deferral, the President indicates that his fiscal year 1987 budget proposes termination of the Economic Development Administration. (In conjunction with this proposal, the President proposes to rescind \$101,309,000 from this account. See Rescission Proposal No. R86-14.) A new office, the Grants and Loans Administration, would be created in the Office of the Secretary of Commerce to close out and monitor outstanding grants and loans. The President reports that these funds are being deferred pending congressional action on the termination proposal. The \$40,000,000 would be available for reappropriation to the new Grants and Loans Administration to administer outstanding grants and loans in the terminated programs.

The justification for this deferral states that the President's fiscal year 1987 budget proposes to transfer \$1.8 million from the fisheries loan fund to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's (NOAA) operations, research and facilities account. NOAA officials told us that the \$1.8 million figure is now incorrect. As a result of actual recoveries of prior year obligations, the fund's balance is \$2,297,436. The budget proposal, according to NOAA and OMB officials, would transfer the entire balance to NOAA's operations account.

Of the funds appropriated for fossil energy research and development, the Continuing Appropriations Act for fiscal year 1986, Pub. L. No. 99-190, 99 Stat. 1185, December 19, 1985, provides that \$29 million is to be available for implementation of a multiyear magnetohydrodynamics (MHD) program. (MHD is a technique for burning coal and other fuels to produce electric power with greater efficiency.) This deferral includes \$13,130,000 of the budget authority appropriated for the MHD program. The President's message includes this \$13 million with other deferred fossil energy research and development funds, but the MHD program is in effect a line item.

Although the funds are not yet being withheld, the Department has advised that its funding of MHD research will be suspended, as a consequence of this deferral, on April 20. Section 1015(b) of the Impoundment Control Act, 2 U.S.C. § 686(b), authorizes the Comptroller General to reclassify as rescissions those deferrals which he believes the President has incorrectly classified. For the reasons discussed below, we are reclassifying as a rescission proposal the \$13,130,000 of MHD funds reported by the President in this message as deferred. We are notifying the Secretary of Energy of this and will monitor the Department's actions. The 45 legislative day period after which the funds must be released will end, based on the current congressional schedule, on May 30, 1986.

The President proposes to use the deferred MHD funds, along with the other \$51,682,000 reported as deferred, to offset fiscal year 1987 fossil energy research and development appropriation requirements. Legislation removing the limitation earmarking the MHD funds is required before they may be used for some other purpose. The President's 1987 budget proposes legislative language to make the earmarked MHD funds available for any fossil energy research and development activity.

As a general matter, we have held that a deferral of funds, as opposed to a rescission, is proper for the purpose

of giving the Congress time to consider a request for legislation to transfer the funds to another account. However, when it appears reasonably certain that the result of the withholding, whether intended or not, will be that the funds can never be used for the intended purpose, the withholding pending legislative transfer is more akin to a rescission. This is the case with MHD: the highly specialized nature of MHD research and the limited number of qualified researchers will effectively preclude reassembling research teams, once lay-offs have resulted in the dispersal of researchers. Hence, resuming MHD research in anything resembling the current form, upon congressional disapproval of the deferral or rejection of the transfer proposal, is unlikely. Moreover, because the MHD program is funded by a line-item appropriation, the funds cannot be used for other fossil energy research and development projects.

The deferred amount is part of a sum of \$1,176,785,000 to be transferred, in accordance with the Department of Health and Human Services Appropriations Act for fiscal year 1986, Pub. L. No. 99-178, to this account from the Federal Hospital

Insurance and the Federal Supplementary Medical Insurance Trust Funds. The message explains that the deferred funds are being withheld pending congressional action on the President's proposal to reduce legislatively the amount of the transfer. Because the Appropriations Act requires obligation of the \$8,489,000 by the end of fiscal year 1986, we intend to reexamine this deferral to assure that the funds are timely transferred and obligated if the Congress does not act to reduce the amount of the transfer.

In addition to this deferral, the President proposes in this message to rescind \$912,000 from this account. See Rescission Proposal No. R86-43.

The total budgetary resources reported for this account do not include \$537,648 of anticipated reimbursements.

DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT

The message does not present clearly the status of the budget authority for six of the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) programs subject to impoundment. Some funds reported as deferred are also included in rescission proposals. To eliminate any confusion regarding these impoundments, we have prepared Table 1, which sets forth the current status of the HUD accounts that are subject to the reported impoundments.

One of the deferrals, D86-41, is the subject of pending litigation. Recently, two lawsuits were filed in the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia, one initiated by several members of Congress, the National League of Cities and others against the Director of the Office of Management and Budget and the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, the other by the City of New Haven, Connecticut, against the United States. The plaintiffs argue, among other things, that the one-House disapproval of deferrals provided for in the Impoundment Control Act is unconstitutional; that the disapproval is not severable from the President's authority to defer; and therefore that these and all other deferrals under the Act are unconstitutional. (New Haven makes other legal arguments as well.) The plaintiffs seek an order requiring that the funds be made available.

Five of these deferrals had already ceased at the time of the message. The President explains that funds were temporarily deferred pending determinations made under the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act, Title II, Pub. L. No. 99-177, 99 Stat. 1038 (Balanced Budget Act). After the sequestration process concluded, the President proposed rescinding the deferred funds, less the Balanced Budget Act sequestrations. OMB and agency officials told us that the rescission proposals reflect the current withholding.

In the sixth account, "Annual contributions for assisted housing - budget authority," funds were also deferred temporarily pending Balanced Budget Act determinations. After the sequestration was made, only part of the deferred funds were proposed for rescission; \$2.3 billion remains deferred. The President proposes to use this money to finance the housing program in 1987.

OMB's latest cumulative report, dated March 10, 1986, shows, incorrectly, that the sequestered amounts in three accounts continue to be deferred:

OMB officials have assured us that these funds are sequestered, not deferred; they explain that HUD simply has not completed processing new apportionment schedules for these accounts to record the sequestration accurately.

One rescission proposal, R86-52, "Rental rehabilitation grants program," is somewhat confusing in that it includes funds from four accounts. Table 2, which follows, enumerates the budget authority for each of these four accounts which is proposed for rescission in R86-52:

This deferral is the subject of two lawsuits pending before the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia, which were filed by several members of Congress, the National League of Cities, and others against the Director of the Office of Management and Budget and the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, and by the City of New Haven, Connecticut, against the United States. (See page 8.)

In this deferral, the President reports the withholding of \$500,000,000 of loan guarantee authority for the Community Development Grants loan guarantee program. The Impoundment Control Act does not apply to loan guarantee authority. Section 1013(a) of the Act, 2 U.S.C. § 684(a), requires the President to report deferrals of "budget authority." The Act specifically excludes loan guarantee authority from its definition of budget authority, 2 U.S.C. § 622(2).

For the period July 1, 1986 through June 30, 1987, the Department of Labor's fiscal year 1986 Appropriations Act, Pub. L. No. 99-178, appropriated for state unemployment insurance and employment service operations \$22,700,000 from the general fund, and authorized expenditure of up to \$769,500,000 from the Employment Security Administration account in the

Unemployment Trust Fund. The President reports a deferral of \$37 million of the funds authorized for transfer from the Trust Fund. In his justification, the President states that the \$37 million "is deferred pending congressional action on the Administration proposal to delete this funding." The President, with his fiscal year 1987 budget proposal, has transmitted to the Congress a supplemental proposal to reduce by \$37 million the amount of funds authorized for transfer from the Trust Fund. Should the Congress agree, the \$37 million would, in effect, revert to the Trust Fund and be available for other purposes of the Trust Fund account.

An OMB official indicated that if the Congress does not accept the President's proposal, the funds will be released, probably in March 1987, to assure their obligation by June 30, 1987, as the Appropriation Act requires. We will monitor the actions of the executive branch to assure that the funds are released in a timely manner.

OMB's cumulative report, dated March 10, 1986, indicates that \$4,880,000 of the amount deferred has been released by OMB. Agency officials told us that this represents the sequestration made pursuant to the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985. The report shows \$61,665,364 as deferred.

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We have reviewed the impoundments reported in the third special message. A copy of the President's listing of those impoundments is enclosed. In some instances, we could not verify information in the message regarding an account's total budgetary resources, because agency officials were unable to reconcile discrepancies between the apportionment schedules and the impoundment message. However, amounts reported as deferred or rescinded are accurate except as noted above.

This report, and our two earlier reports on some impoundments reported in the third special message, provide all information we identified which we believe will be useful to the Congress in its examination of the third special message. Except as identified in these reports, we believe the proposed deferrals are in accordance with existing authority. With regard to the President's rescission proposals, the 45-day
